TITLE	How universities and colleges can communicate with small businesses more effectively
ABSTRACT	The Connect-VET project has created bridges between different sectors to share experiencies and transfer knowledge in the area of Vocational Education and Tranining (VET) education. The sectors represented in the partnership are VET providers, HE institutions, SMEs and Networks. One of the experiences developed during the first year of the project has been an idea from the Norton Radstock College (UK), where they have enabled "Employers Forums" in rural areas to establish current and future skills needs. The employer forums have been set up as practical workshops, where exchange of ideas and networking has been facilitated. The participants were small businesses from different sectors, employment support agencies, practitioners, researchers and students. The participants in these forums have been given the chance to identify and discuss the needs in their sectors, what can be offered to potential students and how to adapt the current curriculum to the real needs of potential employers. The main benefits of these forums are to: attract new employers, identify skills shortages, get practitioners up to date with needs, spot opportunities for training and vacancies in both VET and HE, work with employment support agencies and engage in practical research with businesses. Whilst the pilot is still in its early stages, there has been a high level of interest and engagement from all parties in the process.
